## FROM THE RABBI



Dear Friends,

This is a month full of lasts and firsts, which gives it a bittersweet quality. After thirteen years and fourteen High Holidays, saying goodbye to you, who were our community, is sad. At

the same time, new adventures await. Those moments of transition are the definition of the feeling of awe: we stand on a threshold between old and new.

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**Kayruv means “Welcoming.”**

It is not by accident that our tradition has a *bracha* for times of transitions, which is the *Shehecheyanu*. Saying a blessing for “first times” helps us cross the thresholds of the “last times” with the awareness of God’s presence even in these awesome moments, where that awareness can easily be consumed by anxiety and sadness.

Someone asked for some of my memories of CBI, and they are so many it is hard to choose. As I was cleaning my office, I came across many cards and photos: our arrival, the first adult education classes, our several Jewish festivals, Michaela’s baby naming, Hebrew school Purim plays, Nathaniel and Elliott’s *britot*, pre-Rosh Hashanah hikes, Ariella’s baby naming, Hebrew School activities... and among those pictures there were so many of us whom we buried and still miss.

All these moments made our community, and many more will come. Even though COVID has diminished our physical presence with each other, it has not diminished our sense of community and togetherness. After our first Zoom *bar mitzvah* so many of you wanted to keep having a Zoom service – and that is something positive that COVID has given us: the awareness of our distance and our need to be present again, and our spiritual needs for services. For that, I am so glad.



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One of the things I always shared with anyone who wanted to know more about our community is how we never lacked a minyan for all the years I have been with you. The one time we decided that a minyan wasn't going to happen, it eventually did happen, we just had "called the shot" too early. In a tiny community like ours, this is not a small accomplishment – and that depends on each and every single person present.

I know you will continue to show love for Judaism, Torah and *mitzvot* with Rabbi Nebel. For those who are particularly hurting because of our relationship, I want to share what happened when I came, in that first month of me being CBI's rabbi. Several of those who loved Rabbi Vivie Mayer deeply came to inform me, in my office, that they were leaving CBI because I wasn't her. "Nothing personal," they all guaranteed.

But I beg you not to do this: first, because our relationship does not have to end because I am leaving CBI; second, because your relationship to CBI ought to be larger than just with the rabbi; and third, because each rabbi brings her or his own Torah and personal gifts to CBI, and you will be enriched by new Torah.

Kohelet (Ecclesiastes) 3:5 mentions, in its famous list of "time fors", "time for embracing and time for letting go of the embrace." There are several *midrashim* about this, but none is as perfect as this very moment of experience for us to become aware of the bittersweetness of this time.

Mark, Michaela, Nathaniel, Elliott, Ariella and I are thankful for our embrace, it was long, rich and delightful. I personally hope you will embrace Rabbi Nebel with the same love and intensity. I know that CBI will go from strength to strength.

## MEET HANNAH MANDELL



I knew it was going to be a good interview because Hannah laughed at my jokes. It is a sure sign of genius!

Hannah told me that she was the only Jewish person in her class.

**Glen:** Where were you born?

**Hannah:** In Danbury, from ages 3 - 8, I lived in Torrington, then moved back to Danbury.

**Glen:** How far back do you remember in your life?

**Hannah:** My preschool teacher was Miss Mooney! The first book I remember reading was Clifford the Valentine!

**Glen:** What were your early interests?

**Hannah:** There was a creek behind my house, where I would find fish, turtles, and frogs. I looked for little animals.

**Hannah:** Always. dogs, cats, and a turtle.

**Glen:** Did you ever have any turtle soup?

**Glen:** Good for you! How has the virus changed life for you?

**Hannah:** It is a lot more fun!

**Glen:** Really! O.K., let's hear it, tell all!

**Hannah:** I can wake up at 10:00, go to the beach at 11:00, not go home till 6:00 and do school work for half an hour and be done!

**Glen:** Do you have to go online while you are at the Beach?

**Glen:** Were you in any groups in middle school like chorus, or you mentioned debate club?

**Hannah:** I did everything. I did book club, I did unified sports, I did theatre, I did concert choir, band, I was in the leadership program, and I was in student council.

**Glen:** Woe, woe, woe!

**Hannah:** I was in writing club and math team. I thought I was crazy.

**Glen:** Which was your favorite activity?

**Hannah:** My favorite was definitely creative writing club, but the one I stuck through for three years was theatre.

**Glen:** Were you in some shows?

**Hannah:** I was Tracy Turnblad, in Hair Spray, which was fun. We did the "Lion King" and this year

we were supposed to do "Into the Woods" but it got cancelled.

**Glen:** What do you think this virus business has taught you? Did you learn any lessons from it?

**Hannah:** I think I definitely learned not to take so many things for granted, like not being able to see people. My great grandmother, Marion Mandell lives around the corner from the Holiday Diner. Not being able to go out to dinner with my great grandmother, that has definitely been a big change.

**Glen:** You mentioned going to the beach, which beach do you go to?

**Hannah:** My uncle has a private beach on Candlewood Lake. We call it a beach but it is really a lake.

**Glen:** Have you gone in the water this year?

**Hannah:** Of course! Every day!

**Glen:** You have been going in every day????

**Hannah:** It takes a couple moments to get used to the cold, and then you are good!

**Glen:** Oh my gosh!!!! You were in chorus also?

**Hannah:** I was in concert choir, that was the audition group.

**Glen:** What were some of your favorite pieces?

**Hannah:** We did Carol Of The Bells in seventh grade.

**Glen:** That's a good one!

**Hannah:** That was fun, we had lights, and different colors.

**Glen:** Broadview has a good reputation for their chorus.

**Hannah:** We do. That reputation is strong.

**Glen:** What does *mitzvah* mean to you?

**Hannah:** A good act, something you do for someone, just something good that you do. Even smiling at someone passing by, you can tell they are not having a good day. Something to benefit someone other than yourself.

**Glen:** I love to hear that. It really only takes five seconds to make someone's day! We are going to have at B'nai Israel a *mitzvah* project. This is where you choose a community service project of your choice, and do it for at least a month in honor of someone special to you, someone that you love, or someone that you want to honor, or in memory of someone who has passed away. I hope we can reach out to the students in Hebrew School and you might consider doing that for someone special to you.

**Hannah:** I haven't heard about that yet, I definitely am super interested in that!

**Glen:** That's awesome! What instrument did you play in band?

**Hannah:** I played violin and then dropped it and started piano.

**Glen:** You know I am a violin teacher?

**Hannah:** I think we discussed this two years ago, when I was in the middle of doing it. Before you were President.

**Glen:** Do you still play the piano?

**Hannah:** Not regularly, I am a little rusty, but I can. I know a few songs.

**Glen:** Good for you! What have been two or three highlights in your school life?

**Hannah:** I know in the fifth grade there was this contest around Thanksgiving. They gave you a turkey template, and you had to decorate it, and you got awards for whoever disguised the turkey the best. And I made mine, Donald Trump! I won first place! I will never forget that!

**Glen:** So Donald Trump has his roots in the Turkey?

**Hannah:** I just remember that was my big idea, and I won!

**Glen:** Was he full of stuffing? I will leave that one alone. How about in middle school? Any highlights?

**Hannah:** There are so many.

**Glen:** Did you see any instances of bullying in the middle school?

**Hannah:** Not particularly. Honestly, no.

**Glen:** Can you tell me one thing that you are left with from your Hebrew School education?

**Hannah:** I started so late. I started learning Hebrew around twelve. I had my *mikvah* and became Jewish when I was twelve, so everything was happening so late and everything was rushed. Everything was super fast. Everything I should have learned my entire life was squeezed into two years. So taking away from it, even the meaning of being Jewish, just going there and being with people from the same Jewish community. I will definitely take with me the diversity of being Jewish, people's experiences of being Jewish. How they learned it, and how they practiced it. It's so vastly different - how people practiced, learned and observed. Even learning Hebrew. That's something I will never forget.

**Glen:** Were you able to see a parallel between being Jewish and George Floyd and Black Lives Matter?

**Hannah:** It's hard to compare, it's different types of discrimination and injustices but there are definitely the similarities of people being oppressed and thought of differently and being attacked because of who they are and what they believe in and what they look like. I definitely see the parallel, but it is like comparing apples to oranges.



**Glen:** Wanting to be a lawyer and watching the George Floyd episode play out, do you have any thoughts that come to your mind about the news in the last two weeks?
